- ✓ Sustaining interest in areas until timer goes off/building interest in daily activities.
- ✓ Cleaning up after self (play time, eating, general belongings)
- √ Joining play
- ✓ Unpacking belongings
- \checkmark Transitioning between activities without hesitation/disruption
- ✓ Complete independent activities without prompting



Residing



Reading at home and making it part of your daily routine will help make your child successful at school.

Things to do while Reading:

Before reading ask questions and make predictions.

2. While reading talk about new vocabulary and their meaning.

Make connections to past books or life situations.

4. Discuss the character's and settings while you read.

5. Discuss why things are happening, how do the characters feel etc...

6. Have your child "read" the book. They might make up words

while using the pictures as cues.

7. Have your child turn the pages while reading, fill in the rhymes as you read, notice patterns in the text and illustrations, and notice and talk about letters and the sounds they make.

Place: Make sure you have a cozy place for your child to read. Add cushions, beanbags, fluffy blankets, and stuffed toys. If you are able to leave the house, encourage reading outdoors, in the car. etc...

How: When reading a book, make it fun by using props, puppets,

flashlight, changing your voice, act it out, etc...

What: make sure you have a bunch of different types of books available. Try reading on a device or computer. Listen to the book online. Make sure you have books of different genres, and authors.

Things to read: reading doesn't mean only books. You can also include,

magazines, menus, newspapers, lists, comics, etc...

Keep in mind: Encourage 'yo'ur child to re-read books. Children notice new things after reading the same books over and over. They also build fluency and knowledge.

Help your child LOVE books!




















COUNting



Introduction


Numbers and counting are the basic mathematical skills of preschool. Children learn how to count and recognize their numbers very early on.



Practice counting up to 20 (or more!) with your child as often as you can. Make it a fun game or song while you do different activities together.

Use everyday objects such as buttons or beads to practice counting. Line them up in rows and have your child touch each one while counting.

While driving in the car, have your child try to count the cars passing by — simple games like this will help your child's counting skills greatly!
