K2A is working together with Yumi and Dev in the chapter book, Taking Out the Trash that is written by the Museum of Science EiE Team and collectors to save Danny the Duck. During our engineering adventures, we have been able to explain and demonstrate why removing trash from nature is important and produce different ways to remove the trash from Danny's pond. K2A has also investigated all the materials we will be using to create our trash collectors and thought of different ways we could use each material. The amazing engineers have also begun to create with some materials that has helped them understand how changing the shape of a trash collector can help better retrieve the trash out of the pond. We cannot wait to keep figuring out how to help our friend and continue to be engineers.







#LowerMillsLEADERS in Fifth Grade have been reading A Long Walk to Water by Linda Sue Park for their last novel study of the year. The book is written about two children facing the same social issues but in different years. A little girl named Nya and a boy named Salva journey through Sudan, in hopes of survival. The fifth graders will read a chapter of the book, and then have to answer questions before coming together to discuss what we all read. They have really been enjoying the book, and have been using their writing skills to express their thoughts and feelings about it. Halfway through the book, students were given the prompt "If they were Nya or Salva what would they do, and how would they feel?" They used their knowledge and their own words to express how they would feel if they were walking through Sudan with little family and basic needs. Each student got the opportunity to share their ideas to the class.

Through the collaboration with the Upham's Corner Public Library and Ms. Debbie Foley, students were able to listen to Ms. Zunon's story of how she became an illustrator, her artistic process, why she feels connected to the subjects she illustrates and what inspires her. There was a question and answer session, where the students were able to ask about specific books, her schooling, and her favorite things to create. Students were then given the opportunity to talk about what or who inspires them. Students made thank you posters inspired by Ms. Zunon's preferred palette of colors. It was a fantastic experience for all!

Grade 2 at Columbia has been very lucky throughout this year to host not one but two student teachers from Emmanuel College. Student teachers are a great addition to any classroom because not only do they add extra support to students who need them, but they also bring a new and fresh perspective into the classroom. Students loved Ms. Leadon because of her calm and caring demeanorthey enjoyed making jumps on a number line and reading new stories with her. They use these skills every day as we progress to the end of the school year. With Ms. W, students explored the engineering design process through making play dough and measured sprouts for number corner. These engaging activities captured student attention and made learning fun for students. Altogether, second grade is so thankful to these two ladies and we are so proud of them as they have just graduated!

This semester 4 grade finished the book Lisa of Willesden Lane with a visit from the author Mona Golabek. This was an exciting day at SJP Columbia Road! It was the first time our students met an author in person. Mona inspired the students with her mother Lisa's true story about her life during World War II. Lisa was one of the children on the Kindertransport from Austria to England. The book takes us on Lisa's journey in England and how her love for music became her strength during these troubling times. During this study the students examined the differences between a refugee and an immigrant, a very pertinent classroom discussion for today's current events in Ukraine. This semester in math class, 4th grade challenged themselves to learn the area and circumference of a circle. It was a great culmination for all that we accomplished this year! We needed to use exponents, division, and multiplying with decimals .The students were able to see how far they came this academic year in math. In English Language Arts, our Fourth Graders soar in writing Haiku poems! Haiku is a short three lined poem which originated in Japan. Each line of a Haiku poem is required to have a certain number of syllables - 5 syllables, 7 syllables, and then 5 syllables. Our 4th graders needed to use their creative thinking to craft their language into this poetry format! What superb work!

"spectacular!"












Year End Latin Update

The final project of the year involved students in grades 5 to 7 creating Word Root Superheroes or Supervillains. 

Notes from the Business Office

We are quickly approaching the end of another school year. This is a very busy time as we close out one year and prepare for the upcoming school year in September. Please re-register as soon as possible to confirm a seat! There are some end of year housekeeping items below that will help you transition from one year to the next. As always, please feel free to contact the Business Office with any questions or concerns you may have.

Tuition Payments:

Tuition for the 2021-2022 school year should have been paid in full by the end of April. If you continue to have a balance for tuition or extended day, your registration for the 2022-2023 school year will not be accepted until the balance is paid. No seat can be guaranteed with an outstanding balance. Please review our tuition policy on our website. Please contact the Business Office to discuss your account if you are unable to pay the balance on time.

Financial Aid award notifications will go out no later than June 30th. Notifications will only be sent if your Grant & Aid application is complete, you are enrolled in an active FACTS payment plan, all balances are up to date and you have re-registered for the 2022-2023 school year. The financial aid process for school year 2022-2023 is now closed for returning students. We still encourage all families to complete a financial aid application in order to be eligible for any scholarships the Academy may receive, scholarship assistance is not guaranteed.
