The 2.9 class has been very busy learning many new things such as letters, numbers, shapes, and colors. In addition to all this, they have also been learning about the Church, Church Leaders and their roles. The week before vacation in PreK, we read some Valentine stories, practiced making patterns and talked about being kind to others and making people happy. We completed our Black History Month door. Our class chose to highlight Amanda Gorman, so we used a line from her poem The Hill We Climb to discuss how we can make people happy and "be the light." On Friday everyone wore red for Valentines Day and Asian New Year. Although we couldn't celebrate Valentines Day in the usual way, the students did a sorting activity with Conversation Hearts and we did some exercises and movement to valentine songs. The children went home with a small treat in their backpacks.

The Deadline for Financial Aid Applications is April 15, 2021

As in years past, the requirements are as follows:

 The financial aid applicant must claim the student(s) on their tax return and students must be enrolling in grades K2 – 8 to be eligible. We need all families to submit the Grant and Aid application for the students that will attend the Academy even the Pre-K and K1 students. This will help SJPIICA when we apply for grants for education programs, technology, services, etc.
The federal tax return and W2's for 2020 must be submitted and/or proof of nontaxable income

if not employed.

3. Anyone with a past due SY 20-21 tuition balance will not be awarded financial aid. If you have a past due balance you must reach out to the business office to make a payment arrangement for the balance.
