For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.



At Lower Mills, we have been reading several diverse books throughout Black History Month. This week in PreK-C we read, "Who Are Your People?" by Bakari Sellers and illustrated by Reggie Brown. The story is about how role models and experiences shape children into their unique selves. It is a celebration of the people who came before us. Our students and teachers compared it to stories we read about Dr. Martin Luther King Ir.'s life and the injustices he fought so hard to change. This book is filled with vibrant expressive illustrations that catch young emergent reader's eyes. It is a story that tells of where young black children descend from- "A people who are smart, strong, activists...A people "filled with love, hope and expectation." We even had our own role models join us Black History Month in our classroom-Superintendent Nora and Officer Lauren from Boston Police Department BCE! We will continue to celebrate Black History not only the month of February but throughout our entire school year.

Grade 8 students at Lower Mills participated in celebrating Black History Month by creating an interactive display for the schoolwide door decorating contest. The 2022 theme of Black Health and Wellness aligns with their studies of black practitioners and inventors in the medical field. Students researched and then developed a questionnaire in hopes of stimulating other student's interest. Professional health workers researched included Dr. Rebecca Crumpler, the first African American female to earn a medical degree in 1864 from the New England Female Medical in Boston. Dr. Kizzimeka Corbett, a lead researcher of the COVID-19 vaccine for Moderna. Dr. Russell Joseph Ledet, who received a Ph.D in molecular chemistry in 2018 and then went on to pursue a degree in medicine. He stated, "Curiosity is the first sign that you love science." 8th graders will continue to be curious and are looking forward to the future when some of their names can be added to this prestigious list as they pursue studies in STEM fields.









Lower Mills News

Black History comes alive in our grade 4 mathematics teaching and learning community! Much knowledge has been gained and hurdles overcame in grade 4's math class this school year at the Lower Mills Campus. In our classroom, we are always utilizing opportunities to strengthen our foundational mathematical skills which includes thinking and operating algebraically, using numbers and operations in base ten, and efficiently working through multi-step word problems. We have practiced using multiplication and division to solve word problems, fluently adding and subtracting multi-digit whole numbers using the standard algorithm, and finding whole-number quotients and remainders with up to four digit dividends and one digit divisors; all of these mathematical skills were used to learn about leaders in Black History and the economic culture of the times they lived in. Some of the historical figures we learned about are Ruby Bridges and the cost of food when she was a young student, Michael Jackson and his song productions, Wilma Rudolph and her Olympic awards, Rosa Parks and her movement in Civil Rights, Bessie Coleman attaining her pilot's license, and many other historical and current Black figures. As an educator it is my priority to equip grade 4 #LowerMillsLEADERS with the strategies, content, and skills that will contribute to their success not only in grade 5, but as citizens of our #commUNITY!


The students in Grade 7 have been learning about the ancient civilization of Mesopotamia. The students have been learning what was created during this time such as the wheel, bronze tools and the creation of writing. Grade 7 learned about the ancient written language of cuneiform - a system of writing using clay tablets and symbols to communicate. Students practiced in cuneiform by writing their names in cuneiform! This was a great hands-on experience of learning how communication was different back in ancient times.







Columbia's K2B scholars have been working very hard to grow their brains each and every day. The students love their brand new Wonders curriculum and have been learning a multitude of new material including blending sounds together, memorizing sight words, learning new vocabulary, and diving deep into the topic of the week. Last week's essential question was "What types of bugs do you know about?". The topic sparked the students' curiosity and led to deeper thinking. Throughout the week student's learned about many different bugs, and identified the difference between fiction and nonfiction books. For Bridges Math, students have been practicing various workplace 'games' such as beat you to ten, spill the beans, and which numeral will win. Last month the students did a lot of work with 2d and 3d shapes. The students used geoboards to make 2 dimensional shapes with rubber bands, and Polydrons to create 3 dimensional shapes. K2B really enjoyed creating and naming the different shapes and their attributes.

This semester in math class, grade 4 is examining different methods for solving problems. There is the standard algorithm, give and take, expanded form, and the number line. This choice allows the student to decide which one works best for them. The students are also asked to examine logic, which is so important in our computer centric world. We also made foldables when we dove into long divisions, which are a 3 dimensional organizer that helps students visualize, study, and remember vocabulary terms and concepts. The foldable also allows the students to show their artistic talents. Our foldable mnemonic for long division was "Does McDonalds Sell Cheese Burgers?" Divide, multiply, subtract, check, and bring down. Food and math are a winning combination!

In social studies, we studied the principles upon which our government is based. Every day at morning prayer our school says the Preamble to the Constitution. The Bill of Rights was studied to see how this plan of government has proven to be strong and flexible with these amendments. Then we investigated the 3 branches of government and their responsibilities by using "readers theater", a great strategy in the classroom involving students reading from a script about the subject they are learning about, and helps readers to learn confidence. We invited our principals for our Oscar winning performance! Bravo!

Our creative writing has been focused on adding figurative language to a beautiful winter scene. We have been creating similes, metaphors, and personification to enliven our descriptive skills. Can you imagine the scene with our wonderful language?


