Our teachers are reviewing the data to meet the needs of each student. Our test scores are clearly showing the impact of the pandemic on our students. Our professional development and monthly coaching cycles for teachers and leaders are also helping us to address the needs of each student. We look forward to seeing growth in our January testing.

This school year, we have been participating in COVID Pool testing through the State and Broad Institute each week, and all results have been negative. We have had eight total cases in the Academy since September 8th, and there has not been a spread in our schools. All students who tested positive have contracted the virus outside of school. Your help and support have certainly made a positive impact. Our continued safety measures and working together with families will help our schools remain in person and allow our students to flourish.

We also have a flourishing alumni community. 100% of our students who go onto Catholic high schools go to college! The Class of 2021 received over \$1.2 million in scholarships and financial aid. Our high acceptance rate to the exam schools also speaks to our strong academics and teachers!!



K1A Celebrates Hispanic Heritage! Uno, Dos, Tres

K1A #LowerMillsLEADERS have been celebrating Hispanic Heritage month! During this time of year people all over the country celebrate the culture and traditions of Hispanic people. We have enjoyed a variety of stories, songs and poems. We are even counting in Spanish. Uno means one. Can you count to diez? Muy Bien!



Students in 3B are proud to integrate Spanish into their teaching and learning community. Ms. Smith proudly has a Masters Degree in Education with an Extension in Bilingual Spanish, and also taught English at the University in Spain. #LowerMillsLEADERS in 3B are connecting their Wonders Reading Genre, Narrative Nonfiction, to Hispanic Heritage month through a mini-study of authors Pura Belpré and Gary Soto. Students worked to unpack our guiding question: How do people from different cultures contribute to their community? Third graders read the text Gary the Dreamer by Gary Soto, an author who identifies as Mexican, from their Wonders Literature Anthology. They later watched a narrative depiction about the life of Pura Belpré, a Puerto Rican immigrant who addressed the lack of multicultural texts in her New York City Library by writing her own and sharing stories in English and Spanish. After learning about how Pura and Gary shared their culture through their stories, students pictured are brainstorming ways they share their culture with their community. Students will be using these mentor texts to develop their own personal narratives in the form of a graphic novel! Stop by 3B in the coming weeks to see the final products!



FACTS Payment Plan:

Tuition payments:

If you are behind in tuition payments, you must contact the Regional Business Office located at 1 Eliot Street Milton, MA immediately. At this time 40% of your total tuition is due not including any scholarships and financial aid received.

Please note, tuition payments begin in July. If you have missed any payments at this time you must make those payments online or by calling FACTS Management at 800-624-7092. Your child's continued enrollment in the Academy is dependent on prompt tuition payments. Please refer to the tuition policy on our website at www.sjp2ca.org and available in the Student/Parent handbook.
