Dear Parents,

Welcome back to Saint John Paul II Catholic Academy and a very special welcome to our new parents and families! We are very excited for a great year! Students and teachers are excited to be back and there is a tangible joy and life in our buildings! God's spirit is alive in the eyes and hearts of our children.

This year, the Academy will finish our self-study process for re-accreditation from NEASC (New England Association of Schools and Colleges) with a visit Oct. 15-18th. The New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC) is an independent, voluntary, nonprofit membership organization which partners with over 1500 public, independent, and international schools in the US and worldwide to assess, support, and promote high quality education for all students through accreditation, professional assistance, and pursuit of best practices. NEASC aspires to provide a process for meaningful, ongoing whole school improvement while honoring the unique culture and context of each institution we support. All members of our school community finished reviewing and looking at all parts of our school. We finished writing our report this summer and it has been submitted for review. Thank you to all families and students who filled out surveys and gave us tremendous input. Once our visit is over, we will share with you their findings and our report. From their findings and our report, we will begin work on a new strategic plan for SJP2CA. We are excited to plan for the next 10 years.

Summer is very busy at SJP2CA. We have painted our buildings, added new furniture, improved playground areas, landscaped new areas, fixed fencing, windows, screens and much more. We have welcomed over 100 new students to our Academy. Please continue to recommend the Academy to your friends and family. We have room and would love to welcome new families to our community. We had new staff and programs added to our school such as MooZoom, a guidance program for all students, a STREAM coach to support our teachers, a new Early education coach to help our early education program and support teachers and new administrators with a wealth of experience and commitment to Catholic Education.

Our spring standardized testing showed that we had successfully met the MAP National Goal of 5% growth in Math and Reading for the school year. COVID has certainly caused learning loss and created gaps but with the work of our teachers, coaches, and leadership, we will continue to bridge these gaps and continue to give our students the best. We are finishing our fall MAP testing and looking forward to using that data to guide our plans for the school year.

Daily activities involve counting using concrete objects, gestures, or large body movements, in order to provide ample practice with numerals, one-to-one correspondence, and number sequences. Currently we are counting as high as students are able and watching for common misunderstandings such as skipping over items or counting an item twice. This week, the class played "number jump," which entails jumping the number of times shown by a target numeral. It is always rewarding to eagerly anticipate the remainder of the school year.







Our 5B Lower Mills LEADERS have been working hard and created some amazing Pinwheels for Peace in honor of International Peace Day! During our STREAM lesson, (Science, Technology, Religion, Art, and Math) we are learning about muralist Diego Rivera for Hispanic Heritage Month. Learning about the life he lived, our students used that as inspiration to create their very own SJP murals. Before beginning the Pinwheels for Peace Project, we spent time discussing how peace can take on a different meaning within all of us. When I asked the class what peace means to them, they came up with some bright and unique ideas for their pinwheels. FACTS Payment Plan:

All families in the Academy must be enrolled in the FACTS payment plan. More information about the FACTS Payment Plan application can be found on the home page at <u>www.sip2ca.org</u>. You may also access FACTS through your ParentsWeb account. If you need to change the bank information, make telephone payments, or need access to the payment plan account, please contact FACTS directly at 800-624-7092.

Tuition payments:

If you are behind in tuition payments, you must contact the Regional Business Office immediately. At this time 20% of your total tuition is due not including any scholarships and financial aid received. Violin fees for Grade 5 & Grade 6 and Graduation fees for Grade 8 will be added to your child's tuition payment plan for the 2023-2024 school year. Please note, tuition payments begin in August. If you have missed any payments at this time, you must make those payments online or by calling FACTS Management at 800-624-7092. Your child's continued enrollment in the Academy is dependent on prompt tuition payments. Please refer to the tuition policy on our website at <u>www.sip2ca.org</u>, also available in the Student/Parent handbook (agenda book).
