Dear Middle School Students and Families,

In our continuing effort to promote stronger community growth and more in-depth book discussions next fall we have chosen our new “One Book, One School” title for 2019. **All middle school students in grades 6 through 8 are required to read the book *Terrible Typhoid Mary: A True Story of the Deadliest Cook in America* written by Susan Campbell Bartoletti.** The book and its themes will be woven in throughout the middle school curriculum and community activities for the 2019-20 school year. In addition, **incoming 6th graders are required to choose TWO additional books** (from two different genres) from the attached book list grid while the **7th and 8th graders are required to read THREE additional books.** As always, we encourage students to read MORE than the required amount and students will have the opportunity to share their thoughts on what they have read when they return to school in the fall.

After reading their books, **students are required to write 2 letters to their class.** The first should discuss what they thought and felt while reading the book *Terrible Typhoid Mary* and the second letter should be about one of their chosen books. The letters are due by September 7th. Students will also be expected to do a project or writing assignment about *Terrible Typhoid Mary* this fall in their reading class, so make sure you keep the story fresh in your mind!
